

Section 210.680 of the Houston Lake Municipal Code states:

C. It shall be unlawful for any person to use or discharge any “bottle rockets”.

D. It shall be unlawful for any person to use, ignite or discharge any fireworks within the public right of way of any public street.

E. Fireworks may only be used, ignited or discharged at the following times and dates:

1. From 10:00 a.m. until 10:00 p.m. each day during the period of June twenty-sixth (26) until July second (2nd) and on July fifth (5th); and

2. From 10:00 a.m. until 12:00 a.m. (midnight) each day on July third (3rd) and July fourth (4th).

F. No person shall have in his/her possession Division 1.3 (formerly class “B”) fireworks.

G. Division 1.4 (formerly class “C”) fireworks may be possessed during periods herein provided.

Chief Edward De La Fuente enlisted on June 30th, 1986 into the Sea College Program of the United States Navy. Due to delayed entry, he shipped out on June 2, 1987, for basic and apprentice training at Great Lakes Naval Training Station. Upon completion of training, he was assigned to the United States Ship Harlan County (LST-1196) at Little Creek Naval Amphibious Base in Va, Sept. 2, 1987. He spent the next 21 months aboard the ship completing one deployment to the Mediterranean Sea, among other operations. Completing his active duty tour, June 1, 1989, he continued his naval service at Naval and Marine Corp Reserve Center Kansas City for 3 months before transferring to Armed Forces Reserve Center, Springfield, Mo., while attending Evangel College, (receiving a Bachelor of Science in Psychology in 1992). He was assigned to Shipboard Intermediate Maintenance Activity San Diego, and the United States Ship Okinawa (LPH-3). Upon graduation, he transferred back to the now (name change) Naval Operational Support Center Kansas City, Mo. He was assigned to Competent (AFDM-6), Pearl Harbor, HI, remaining until the unit was decommissioned in 1997, transferring to Military Sealift Command Far East, and Military Sealift Command Korea until Oct 2003. Serving a short stint with the Beachmaster's Unit 6 (about 6 months), he transferred to Naval Operational Support Center, Wichita in April 2004, and was assigned to Naval Support Activity Bahrain Detachment E, where he was promoted to Chief Petty Officer, Sept. 16, 2006, and remaining with NSA Bahrain until becoming part of the Operational Support Unit (June 2009-Oct 2010). Upon reaching higher tenure, he transferred back to Naval Operational Support Center, Kansas City and was assigned into the Voluntary Training Unit 1808G until June 2016.

During his Navy career, Chief De La Fuente received two Navy Achievement Medals (2003 and 2005), Sailor of the Quarter and Sailor of the Year (2005). He currently works fulltime at Bio-Microbics in Shawnee, and part-time at Target in Overland Park, (both in Kansas). He retires after 29 years of service to his home in Overland Park, along with his wife of 18 years, Jennifer De La Fuente.

Edward DeLaFuente is the son of Betty DeLaFuente, lived here on Houston Lake and went to school at Park Hill.

Entry Form and Guidelines:

1. All Artwork must be original, created by the registered artist or artists. No more than two entries per artist or a group of artists, but more than one artist may submit from a single Houston Lake family.
2. The Call to Artists opens on **March 23, 2016** and submissions will be accepted at any regular monthly meeting of the HLAC. Extra entry forms are available then as well. All entry forms must be in by **August 1, 2016**. Entry forms may be mailed to the Houston Lake Arts Circle, c/o City Hall, 5417 N Adrian, Houston Lake, Mo 64151. They may also be dropped off at City Hall, or given to an HLAC board member, or delivered during the regular monthly meeting of the HLAC (the third Saturday of the month at 10 am.)
3. Deadline for final delivery of entered pieces is **Sunday, August 14 between 2:00 pm and 4:00 pm**, or by special arrangement via appointment with an Arts Circle board member. Delivery can also be made at any monthly meeting of HLAC at City Hall.
4. Visual art in two dimensions cannot exceed 30” x 36”. All two dimensional art will need to be museum wrapped canvas, or framed, and ready to hang with wire. HLAC does have some frames available for use in limited sizes—please inquire about using those.
5. Three-dimensional art, such as sculptures for indoor display cannot exceed 3’ x 3’, are to weight less than 50 pounds and must be free-standing. Sculptures for outdoor display cannot exceed 3’w x 6’h, must be freestanding and weatherproof.
6. Other art forms that need to be filmed or recorded cannot exceed ten minutes of performance time, and must be in a standard format. Permission will be asked to display these pieces on social media sites, as well as, at a City Hall Screening for the exhibit opening. Contact Rick Cowan with questions at 816-536-9282.
7. All accepted entries will be displayed during the opening weekend of “*Drip, Dribble and Splash*”. The review committee will determine the schedule that each piece will be on display following that and will notify the artist accordingly. All pieces must remain up during their scheduled time. All pieces will remain property of the artist. The artist is responsible for collecting their work when the exhibition ends. Any work not reclaimed after 4 weeks past the end date becomes property of HLAC.

From the Desk of the City Clerk:

USER INSTRUCTIONS FOR THE ENVIRONMENT/ONE GRINDER PUMP

Our sewage grinder pumps are aging. We are seeing a few more pump failures than we did when our systems were new. We now know there are a few things that can be done to help prevent premature failures. It is recommended that you use a liquid detergent for laundering.

CARE AND USE OF YOUR GRINDER PUMP

The Environment/One grinder pump is capable of accepting and pumping a wide range of materials. Regulatory agencies advise the following items should not, however, be introduced into any sewer, either directly or through a kitchen waste disposal unit:

Glass, diapers, socks, rags or cloth, metal, plastic objects (toys, utensils, etc.), seafood shells, sanitary napkins or tampons.

In addition, you must NEVER introduce into any sewer:

Explosives	Strong Chemicals
Flammable Material	Gasoline
Lubricating Oil/Grease	

Do not use caustic solutions for drain cleaning. If you must use a drain cleaner, use an enzyme cleaner.

PERIODS OF DISUSE

We have found that in very cold weather, a pump can potentially freeze-up if there is no water usage in the house. If you are going to be gone during the cold weather, we would recommend that you have a friend, neighbor or relative run some hot water down the sink every day or two. This seems to keep the pump from freezing

CAUTION: DO NOT DISCONNECT POWER TO THE UNIT

POWER FAILURES

Your grinder pump cannot dispose of wastewater without electrical power. If electrical power service is interrupted, keep water usage to a **MINIMUM**, please!

The Environment/One Grinder Pump is installed with a warning device. The yellow light should be removed and tested periodically. If you see a yellow pump light on, or the horn blowing on the Southside of the Lake, or if you have any questions about your sewer system, **PLEASE** call Joyce Kullman at 816-547-8173 or Melinda Cook at 352-8401.

One last recommendation – **DO NOT** run your gutter down spouts or sump pumps into your sewer system.

Introduction

Monarch larvae appear to feed exclusively on milkweeds in the genus *Asclepias* and several other genera of viny milkweeds in North America. Milkweeds are perennial plants, which means an individual plant lives for more than one year, growing each spring from rootstock and seeds rather than seeds alone. In the Midwest, milkweeds were historically common and widespread on prairies, but habitat destruction has reduced their range and numbers.

Milkweeds belong to the family *Asclepiadaceae*, derived from Asklepios, the Greek god of medicine and healing. Though most members of the genus *Asclepias* are tropical, there are approximately 110 species in North America known for their milky sap or latex contained in the leaves. Most species are toxic to vertebrate herbivores if ingested due to the cardenolide alkaloids contained in the leaves and stems. When Monarch larvae ingest milkweed, they also ingest the plants' toxins, called cardiac glycosides. They sequester these compounds in their wings and exoskeletons, making the larvae and adults toxic to many potential predators. Vertebrate predators may avoid Monarchs because they learn that the larvae and adults taste bad and/or make them vomit. There is considerable variation in the amount of toxins in different species of plants. Some northern species of milkweed contain almost no toxins while others seem to contain so much of the toxins that they are lethal even to monarch caterpillars.

Floral Structure

Flowers are significant in plant identification because flowers are intricate structures with many features that can be assessed, counted, and measured. Affinities among closely related species can be shown because floral morphology is conservative. Leaves and stems have features shared across many groups and lack unique combinations of features for species identification.


Like other flowers, milkweeds have floral whorls of sepals (collectively referred to as the calyx) and petals (collectively called the corolla). Flowers of milkweeds are interesting because they have an third whorl of five hoods each of which encloses a horn (modified filaments of the anthers). Together, hoods and horns are referred to as the corona. The horns of some species are long, while the horns of others are reduced to the point they cannot be seen.

Pollination

Milkweeds have a unique and fascinating pollination mechanism in which the plant relies on *Lepidoptera* (butterflies and moths) and *Hymenoptera* (bees, ants, and wasps) for pollination. Hundreds of pollen grains are packaged into two connected sacs or pollinia, which is



collectively referred to as the pollinarium [see SEM photo at right]. When a foraging insect lands on a flower, the pollinarium can easily attach itself to its leg. Once removed from the flower, the pollinia actually re-orient as the translator arms bend as they dry. Upon landing on another flower, the properly oriented pollinarium is deposited into a receptive stigmatic groove where the pollinia breaks down and the pollen germinates, growing pollen tubes through the stigma to the ovules in the ovary.



The milkweed fruit is a follicle, commonly referred to as a pod, which splits at one suture to release many seeds, sometimes hundreds, depending on the species.

CANADA GEESE DAMAGE MANAGEMENT

PUBLIC HEALTH ISSUES

Canada geese (*Branta canadensis*) are a modern success story for wildlife management. At one time, numbers of Canada geese were in serious decline. However, the actions of various wildlife agencies have brought their numbers in North America to an estimated 5,600,600 (U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service 2009).

Unfortunately, this dramatic increase in population has resulted in some negative consequences.


First, large numbers of geese leave large quantities of feces. A single goose can defecate every 20 minutes (Bowen and Valiela 2004) up to 1.5 pounds of feces each day (French and Parkhurst 2009). This problem is magnified when we realize that approximately 67% of those geese are non-migratory or resident geese (Dolbeer 2006). In other words, land and lakes frequently do not get a sustained rest from geese presence. If large numbers of geese congregate, one must wonder if there is a health risk related to the feces left on ground and in the water. French and Parkhurst (2009) note that "beaches and other public areas littered with accumulated goose feces have been closed due to the contamination or the threat of personal injury resulting from falls as people lose footing on the slippery material." So concerns regarding goose droppings are not simply speculative.

Human Health and Safety:

Many residents are concerned that Canada geese pose a potential threat to human health and safety. There has been speculation from public resource managers, citizens, and the media that Canada geese can transmit diseases to humans through direct contact with feces or through water-borne disease transmission. Although scientific studies have shown Canada goose feces to possess human pathogens such as *Cryptosporidium species*, *Giardia species*, *Salmonella species*, and *E. coli*, the potential risk of transmission to humans is not well understood. However, drinking water reservoirs and swimming areas have been temporarily closed due to high levels of *E. coli* attributed to goose feces.



Canada geese can be aggressive.

As a precautionary measure people are encouraged to minimize direct contact with goose feces, remove shoes prior to entering the home following contact, and wash hands thoroughly with an antibacterial soap. Additional examples of safety concerns include goose/aircraft collisions, traffic hazards, slipping on goose droppings, and being attacked by aggressive geese (which often occurs when people get too close to nests or goslings).

So, if you are at the beach with children, you can point out geese feces to them with instructions to stay away, and can tell them not to place their hands or fingers into their mouths while they are playing on the beach. Also, they need to wash their hands after leaving the beach and, even more importantly, before eating.

Please do not feed the Geese!

SUMMARY:

Canada geese in New Jersey and elsewhere provide a range of economic, recreational, aesthetic, and ecological benefits. However, these positive benefits are often overlooked because of negative impacts to agricultural crops and damage to residential, commercial and public property, and natural resources. Concerns raised by citizens, natural resource managers, and the media about possible human health and safety issues have also had an effect on the way Canada geese are now perceived by the general public.

ARTICLE II. PERMITS

SECTION 500.100: BUILDING PERMIT REQUIRED

All persons desiring to construct, erect, alter or add to any building, boat dock, fences, road or drive or any structure in the City of Houston Lake, Missouri, must first obtain a building permit for such construction, alteration or addition from the Board of Aldermen of said City. (Ord. No. 282 §2, 10-14-02)

SECTION 500.110: PERMIT APPLICATIONS

All persons desiring to obtain such a permit shall submit an application with the complete plans and specifications and plot plan for such construction showing sizes, estimated cost and details of such proposed construction and the location of such construction upon the plot of land. No new dwelling construction or property line fence construction will be permitted until after certified surveys have been filed with the Board of Aldermen. Certified surveys will be required on all additions to old dwellings where the new construction will be closer to the property line than the old dwelling. (Ord. No. 282 §3, 10-14-02) Applications for a building permit may be obtained by leaving a message at City Hall, contacting your Alderman or calling City Clerk at 816.352.8401

2. Lake Wristband must be worn by Residents, Lot Owners and Guests. Wristband should be visible.
3. Private property. No trespassing. Residents, lot owners and guests only.
4. Property owners are responsible for the conduct and actions of their guest at all times.
5. No DIVING from the Swimming Docks because of shallow water.
6. No. swimming after 9:00p.m.
7. Alcohol will not be allowed in the beach area.
8. Animals will not be allowed in the beach area.
9. Fishing will not be allowed in the swimming area.
10. No disorderly conduct.
11. All Rules and Regulations of the Missouri State Conservation Commission will apply.
12. No trot lines, jug lines or unattended fishing lines are permitted.
13. All Terrain Vehicles, motor bikes, motor cycles and motor scooters are prohibited from operating on Homes Association property.

Minutes of June 15, 2016

Board Members present: Sherry Burrup, President; Nick Jackalone, Vice President; Jan Jackalone, Secretary/Treasurer; Justin Burrup Board Member. Absent Craig Sovereign, Board Member. Eight member households were represented in attendance.

Meeting began promptly at 6:30 PM. President Burrup thanked everyone for attending. Pres. Burrup said she was working with Linda Kramer for getting an area near the edge of the peninsula ready to plant milkweed for a Monarch Butterfly garden.

Pres. Burrup also said that there was a need for individuals to head up teams for projects like Structure Maintenance, Lake Equipment Maintenance, Spillway, etc. Joe Chepren was asked and said he was already working on getting a company to remove the debris by the rock damn.

Pres. Burrup also said she was wanting to develop a list of who is responsible for what on the lake for people to call directly. Janette Boehm was dubbed the Animal Control Lady for critters like ground hogs and moles and the like that if left alone would cause havoc on and around the Mayor's Park and the one lane roadway.

So Pres. Burrup will be asking for people to come forward and sign up to head up these teams.

Regarding the lake filters: Pres. Burrup sent an email to the company that handles these in the hopes they would offer a solution to our problem. Seems the filters and lines are being held down by cement blocks. So to change the filters, she is looking for some guidance so as not to damage the filters and lines while doing maintenance on them. (Anyone like to scuba dive and help us out here?)

There was a large dead tree limb and branches that made its way just past the walk bridge from the heavy recent rains. It is jammed up against the KC sewer line that is just under the walk bridge. Pres. Sherry said she was willing to pull it out with her truck, but didn't want to cause any damage to the sewer line so she has contacted KC Sewer to possibly remove it without cost to the HOA.

Jan Jackalone, Secretary/Treasurer, gave the current balance of the HOA accounts. She also stated that James Wright, Attorney for HOA, sent letters out to 17 members that are delinquent on their dues. Hopefully, we can get those dues flowing into the HOA bank account. As it stands now, we are short of our estimated influx by about \$9,000. Also, there are currently seven liens on properties that owe \$1,000 or more.

Open Discussion came next and Joe Chepren brought us up to date on the 56th and Northwood development. He had an upcoming meeting with the developer. They currently are moving dirt to another site; however there is a concern about these large trucks driving without the load being covered by tarps. Joe suggested anyone seeing that should take a picture of the truck with license plate and let him know.

Joe Chepren also said that many times he has asked fishers if they have their lake bracelets and have asked them to leave. He suggested we sell them a permit to fish on the lake for \$295.00 and they would then have the bracelet.

Joe Chepren mentioned that since several members had not paid their dues that the budget for 2016 needed to be adjusted. That means basically not doing any of the proposed projects for 2016. He also suggested that the Board monitor its fixed expenses and administrative expenses so that the money market funds don't need to fill in any shortfall. He cautioned that if the trend continues of non-payment of dues and using the money market to fill in would leave us broke in a few years.

Joe wanted to know if the Board was going to follow the 2016 Task Plan that was discussed in late 2015. Pres. Burrup acknowledged that the Board is in the process of putting the recommendations to work. Joe thanked the Pres. for taking the Task Plan and using it.

Taking a different approach to the style of Board Meetings was discussed. Joe and several members agreed that using a "Round Table" approach to the meetings would lead to more interaction of ideas between the Board and Members.

Official Minutes of the Council Meeting
May 9, 2016

The Council of the City of Houston Lake met in regular session on May 9, 2016 at City Hall. The following members were present: Mayor Joyce Kullman, Aldermen Phil Otte, Evadene Judge, Rick Cowan, and Pam Freese.

Opening Session

The meeting was called to order at 7:30 p.m. by Mayor Joyce Kullman.

Public Discussion

Resident Jan Jackalone stated that it has been rumored throughout the lake that there is a problem with the efficiency of our Codes Enforcement Officer, Ethan Dean. Jan, along with the other attendees showed their respect and support in agreement that Ethan has done an outstanding job and strongly urges the council to support his efforts and salary. She further stated that she would like the board to take into consideration all the aspects of taking over the responsibilities of this position.

Resident Janet Halterman stated that since she has lived in Houston Lake this is the first time she has seen anyone clean up our neighborhood. She further stated that Ethan has taken an interest in Houston Lake and is worth every bit of the salary.

Resident Gary Halterman inquired as to what procedures our Codes Enforcement Officer Ethan Dean would be enforcing. Will he be actively seeking violations or complaint driven only? Mayor Joyce Kullman stated that some of the council wants Ethan to be complaint driven only, and she stated that she is opposed to that, and feels that it is pretty easy to go out and see the violations, get all visible violations cleaned up and then become complaint driven only. Mayor Kullman feels that we owe it to our residents to take care of our city and not let it get out of control. Mayor Joyce Kullman stated that she spoke with Parkville, and they have a complaint system on their website, and that she will be working with resident Jean Anderson, in hopes of getting a similar system on our city website. Alderman Rick Cowan stated that although council members may have varying views on that, the enforcement lies under the executive branch, which is in this case the Mayor. The Mayor mandates how that will be driven, in this case it would be looking for violations instead of complaint driven. Our Codes Enforcement Ethan Dean stated that as of now about 90% of the violations have been corrected and he has five summonses for court. The majority of the worst case scenarios are being dealt with.

Resident Joseph Briones inquired about erosion coming from construction west of Houston Lake that is clearly running into our lake. Joseph did a drive by of the property and could see some type of erosion control on the North side. He stated that we do have laws that protect the water. Mayor Kullman stated that council would check into this matter.

Minutes April 18, 2016

The April 18, 2016 minutes were approved by general consent.

Building Permit

A new recreational burning permit for 5509 NW Adrian was approved by the Council, with Alderman Otte excused.

Treasurers Report

The Treasurer's report was approved by the Council.
The Treasurer's report shows a balance of \$353,222.68.

Resolution 5-9-16 (paybills)

The City Council approved Resolution 5-9-16 unanimously.

New Business

a. Alderman Rick Cowan stated that we need to schedule a meeting with the homeowners that are on grinder pumps. Mayor Kullman stated that the grinder pump fund is underfunded, we will be holding a meeting for the 37 homes/residents that are on grinder pumps and the goal is to get everyone up to speed, it is a public meeting so anyone will be able to attend. Alderman Cowan stated that ultimately there will probably need to be a vote on what we establish a fee at, or for the city to get out of the grinder pump business, as of right now, we are \$21,000.00 into to our general fund to compensate residents for a replacement of their grinder pumps. Mayor Kullman stated that the grinder pumps are approximately 30 years old and are failing, we repair the ones we can, if they are beyond repair then we replace them. We will contact Haynes Equipment, which maintains the pumps, for more information. A meeting will be held for the residents with grinder pumps when we have more information.

b. City Administrator Joe Chepren provided a copy of his activity log for March and April. Joe stated that he has reached out to Nebraska Furniture Mart and McCray Lumber to inform them about the weight limit on our bridge; he has not seen any more of their trucks around since. He asked that if any residents see them, please let him know. Joe stated that he has been locating culverts around the lake, and digging them out to provide better drainage. Joe also informed everyone that he is working towards getting information for the road surfaces; he has a meeting set for tomorrow with a contractor from Modern Paving Systems Incorporated. They will be doing site work and discuss what had been done in the past with the roads, to decide which direction to go with phasing out, and creating scopes of work for the road work and that will put us on the budget radar. Joe informed everyone that he would be using the standard three bid process. The mission of the meeting is facts gathering to create a scope of work, and to use the contractor who has done work previously for Houston Lake, whom he believes would be a good candidate for helping to create the scope of work accurately.

Sheriff's Report

The Platte County Sheriff's Department submitted a police report for the month of April, 2016.

Code Enforcement

Codes Enforcement Officer Ethan Dean informed everyone that he along with a few of his neighbors would be helping out at our Spring Clean Up on May 21, 2016. Alderman Freese stated that Drew Freese will also be available to help.

A codes report was presented to council and attendees, for the months of April and May. Mayor Joyce Kullman informed everyone that we would be mimicking the format of the police report, so no contact information will be revealed. Mayor Kullman stated that Ethan has been working very hard, and that it is not a pretty/easy job, and thanked him for all his hard work. Codes Enforcement Officer Ethan Dean stated that, you could clearly see that in just two weeks, violations have been cut down in half. Ethan expressed his gratitude for the support from the residents. Ethan stated that the first six months was going to be the rough part, and after the first six months he has no objections to cutting down the salary. He can see changes and that is his main concern.

Vaccination

The owner or keeper of any dog or cat in the City of Houston Lake is hereby required to have such animals vaccinated against rabies by a licensed veterinarian and to procure a certificate of such vaccination from the veterinarian and to present such certificate to the City Clerk on or before **May first (1st) of each year**; and the City Clerk shall register such certificate, which registration shall remain in force until the April thirtieth (30th) next following said registration. It shall be unlawful for the owner or keeper of any dog or cat to permit such animal to remain in the City of Houston Lake unless vaccinated as above provided. **(Section 205.020 Municipal Code)** *(A certificate of vaccination can be placed in the mail box next to the front door.)*

Fishing

It shall be unlawful for any person to pursue, take, transport, ship, buy, sell, possess or use any fish from any body of water within the City without possessing a valid fishing permit issued by the Missouri Department of Conservation. This section shall not apply to any person 65 years of age or older or is 15 years of age or younger. **(Section 210.690 Municipal Code)**

Parking:

No vehicle shall be parked on any street within the city limits of Houston Lake, MO. **(Chapter 300 - Schedule II, Municipal Code)**

All-Terrain Vehicles:

No person shall operate an All-Terrain Vehicle upon the streets of this city. **(Section 340.110 Municipal Code)**

DISCHARGING
AIR GUN, ETC.

Any person within the limits of this City who shall discharge any BB gun, spring gun, paint gun or air gun or shall shoot any pebble, bullet, slug, arrow or other hard substance by means of a sling, crossbow, rubber band or bow or any other means shall be deemed guilty of an ordinance violation; provided however, that this Section shall not apply to any person or organization authorized by the City of Houston Lake to possess and discharge such devices for the purpose of waterfowl pest control. (Ord. No. 303, 9-12-05) **(Section 210.285 Municipal Code)**
