



REPETITIVE WALKS: FINDING WONDER IN THE FAMILIAR

You hear a lot about how walking is great for you. It is a form of exercise that benefits your heart and body. It boosts your mental health, gives you an opportunity to clear your mind and “touch grass” as they say. Walking is accessible- you don’t have to drive to a park, gym, or walking trail to get a nice walk in. Since I’ve moved to Houston Lake several years ago, I have been taking advantage of our quiet roads and lovely views several times a week, and I thought I’d ramble on a bit about that this month.

In a world that constantly encourages newness, novelty and excitement, the idea of taking the same walk often might seem mundane to some. Yet, once you embrace the rhythm of repetitive walks you’ll find something that may surprise you: a deepened sense of awareness, a connection to your surroundings, and a subtle but profound shift in perspective.

At first, the route may feel predictable—passing the same trees, houses, or city streets. But as the days go by, the walk transforms. You start noticing small details: the way light filters through the leaves at different times of day, the scent of blooming flowers in spring, or how a particular cement dog moves locations in a yard. There are seasonal surprises too. Last spring we had a pair of orioles that were nesting in a tree down by the bridge, I spotted them for weeks singing their happy songs and flitting around with shocking orange flashes. For several years a lone sycamore sapling had taken root

along the dam and last summer finally reached what I’d consider height to be a “real tree” only to find it cut down and hauled off by a beaver come fall. Even among the constants, there is an ever-changing flow to things brought on by the seasons and time. Water hibiscus repetitively greening, blooming, and now barren sleeping through winter. My familiar path becomes a type of evolving canvas on which nature and life continue to paint ever-changing scenes.

For me these walks create a sense of place and belonging. The path you tread regularly becomes part of your story—a thread connecting you to the landscape, the seasons, and the people you encounter along the way. During this year’s epic snow I donned my coveralls and went

out for a short walk. During this outing so many of you, my neighbors, were out shoveling your driveways and almost everyone took the time to stop and say hello. I enjoyed the connection, updates, and touch points by all, what a fond walking memory that was. I’ve met your new dogs, appreciated your yards, and picked up trash left behind by others. This is our place and we care for it.

I suppose in short, I believe that in a world that often feels chaotic, the simple ritual of a familiar walk reminds me that magic isn’t always found in far-off places—it exists right where we are, waiting to be noticed. Houston Lake offers so much subtle wonder and I encourage you to get out and enjoy it.



ADDYS AWARD IN HONOR OF RICK COWAN

Saturday night, February 22nd, the American Advertising Awards Show, commonly known as the Addys, presented the

Uptown Theater in Kansas City. TorchHouse Studios received the trophy for the work they did on a commercial for UMKC School of Theatre and Dance.

This award is presented each year for work that was inspired by the standards set by the late Rick Cowan, a resident of Houston Lake for many years. The Addys Award was presented by Rachel Kephart, the Film Commissioner of Kansas City, and is funded by the KC Film Office each year. Wendy Thompson, Rick's widow, usually presents the trophy, but was unable to attend this year.

Rick was a filmmaker who produced three feature films, and over two hundred television commercials during his life, but he started out as a location scout. He discovered he had a special talent for finding exactly the scene the director envisioned. To him, the right location was an important character in the story he was telling, whether it was a thirty-second spot or a two-hour feature film. One of those perfect locations was right here on the lake.

Early in his career, Rick was scouting for a well-organized garage for a commercial shoot for Sutherland Lumber, which used to be in North Kansas City. They were looking for a garage that had exposed beams.

Rick noticed that feature in his neighbor's garage. Don Mackey let him take a look, amid lots of questions of course. So, Rick snapped some photos to show the director. The director liked

No one is ever really prepared to have a film crew descend on their property. Even though Rick was always honest about the scope of that endeavor, it can be overwhelming. Sure enough, as the trucks and cameras and lights and crew moved in, the entire neighborhood became concerned. Even Chuck Burgess, next door to Mackey's house, got involved by offering a place to park their food truck to feed the crew. As a resident of the community, Rick had taken for granted his authority to bring this commotion into the neighborhood. It wasn't until Mary Head, the mayor's wife at the time, asked 'what the heck was going on' that Rick saw that he needed to smooth some ruffled feathers. Since it was on private property and they weren't blocking the streets, a formal permit was not needed. Still, Rick did his best to make sure that everything ended well so that film crews would be welcomed back.

Don confirmed that it was a good experience, although he recently said he turned down another inquiry for the same thing a few years later. Once is enough. Rick knew better than to let a film crew shoot at his own house, although that decision may have been influenced by his wife.

A STORY FROM GENE CHARLES

Here is a case of curiosity gone horribly wrong:

One guy, Linsey, spent a month in the hospital with burns. He later became one of my best buddies. Fast forward to the present then back up several years. I had written a letter and located him. We were talking on the phone one day and he said that he had had his legs stretched across the top of the tank and when it split open it flipped him backwards over the side of the truck. I wanted to tell him, but didn't, that he was lucky that burns was all he got because if that had happened as we were rolling down the street it would, no doubt, have been a different outcome. The truck driver was reprimanded for hauling the tank around.

Use this application to:

1. Register to vote in any election in Missouri.
2. Register to vote when you move from one jurisdiction (St. Louis City, Kansas City, or any county) to another jurisdiction (St. Louis City, Kansas City, or any county) within Missouri.
3. Change the address on a current voter registration when you move within a jurisdiction.
4. Change the name on a current voter registration.

Other information:

1. You must be 18 years of age by the day of a particular election to be eligible to vote in that election.
2. If mailed, this form must be postmarked by the 4th Wednesday preceding an election to be eligible to vote in that election. If delivered in person, it must be received in the office of the election authority by the 4th Wednesday preceding an election. (See reverse for election calendar.)
3. Submitting this application to an individual other than the election authority does not insure timely voter registration.
4. After the election authority receives your voter registration application, you will be sent confirmation within 7 business days. If you do not receive confirmation, contact the election authority.
5. If you wish to serve as an election judge on election day please contact your local election authority and mark the box at the bottom of this form.
6. Optional—If registering by mail for the first time, please submit a copy of one of the following forms of identification: current or valid photo ID, current utility bill, bank statement, government check, paycheck or other government document that shows your name and address, birth certificate, Native American tribal document or other proof of United States citizenship. (You will be required to present identification when you vote.)





